Hurricane Helene: Unprecedented Storm, Extraordinary Response

Our region had never experienced anything like Hurricane Helene. No one could have anticipated or fully prepared for the record flooding and destruction unleashed upon our picturesque mountain communities. In fact, many residents remarked that the damage was even more severe than what Hurricane Hugo left in 1989.

In the wake of the storm, Ashe County Schools quickly mobilized to support the community, providing essential services including emergency shelter, supply distribution, and hot meals. The school district's swift actions transformed school buildings into vital resources for residents seeking comfort and assistance. Ashe County's three elementary schools became hubs for supply delivery, while the high school served as an emergency shelter. Throughout the recovery, the district provided laundry services, showers, and communal meals, fostering a spirit of unity among neighbors as they worked together to rebuild.

To further assist families, the district offered free afterschool camps for K-8 students and children of first responders from October 14 to October 25. These camps provided crucial care during a challenging time, with regular after-school programs resuming on the first day back to school.

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Overcoming challenges

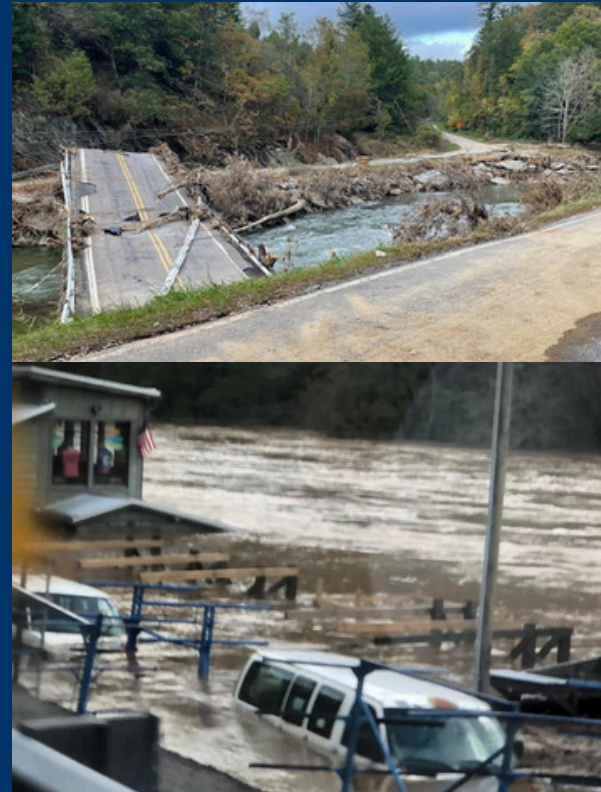
Despite facing significant obstacles, Ashe County Schools prioritized getting students back in the classroom. Remote learning wasn't feasible for many families without electricity or internet access, and severe damage to roads and bridges complicated the evaluation of safe bus routes.

"The safety of students and staff traveling across the county has been and will remain a top priority," said Dr. Eisa Cox, Superintendent.

The Transportation Department worked closely with the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) to develop new bus routes. Over 200 students required new stops, and 23 of the 31 bus routes were adjusted. The number of students needing a community stop decreased from over 200 to 88 due to the NCDOT's progress. For the first four days back, buses operated on a two-hour delay to ensure safety, and they ran on a one-hour delay the following week.

Extracurricular activities, including high school sports and band practices, resumed on October 14, allowing students to continue their fall season. Participation was made voluntary, recognizing the ongoing recovery for some families.

For mental health resources and food security information, community members are encouraged to contact local support services.



While the state forgave 20 instructional days lost due to the hurricane, adjustments to the 2024-25 school calendar were necessary. Upcoming changes include:

- January 2 - Annual Leave Day
- January 3 - Required Teacher Workday
- January 6 - First day back for students after Christmas break
- January 31 - Required Teacher Workday (may change due to weather)
- February 14 - Regular Student Day
- March 13-14 - Regular Student Days
- Spring Break Changes - April 23-25 will now be regular school days

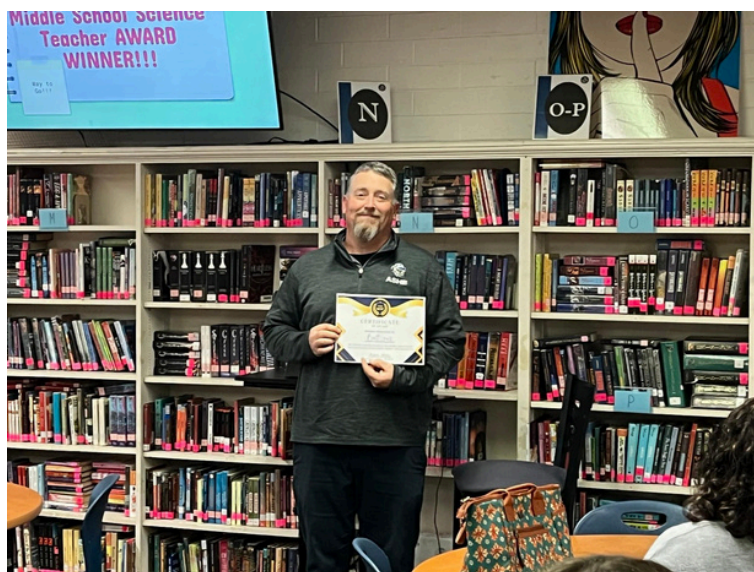
Lewis Receives NCSTA Award

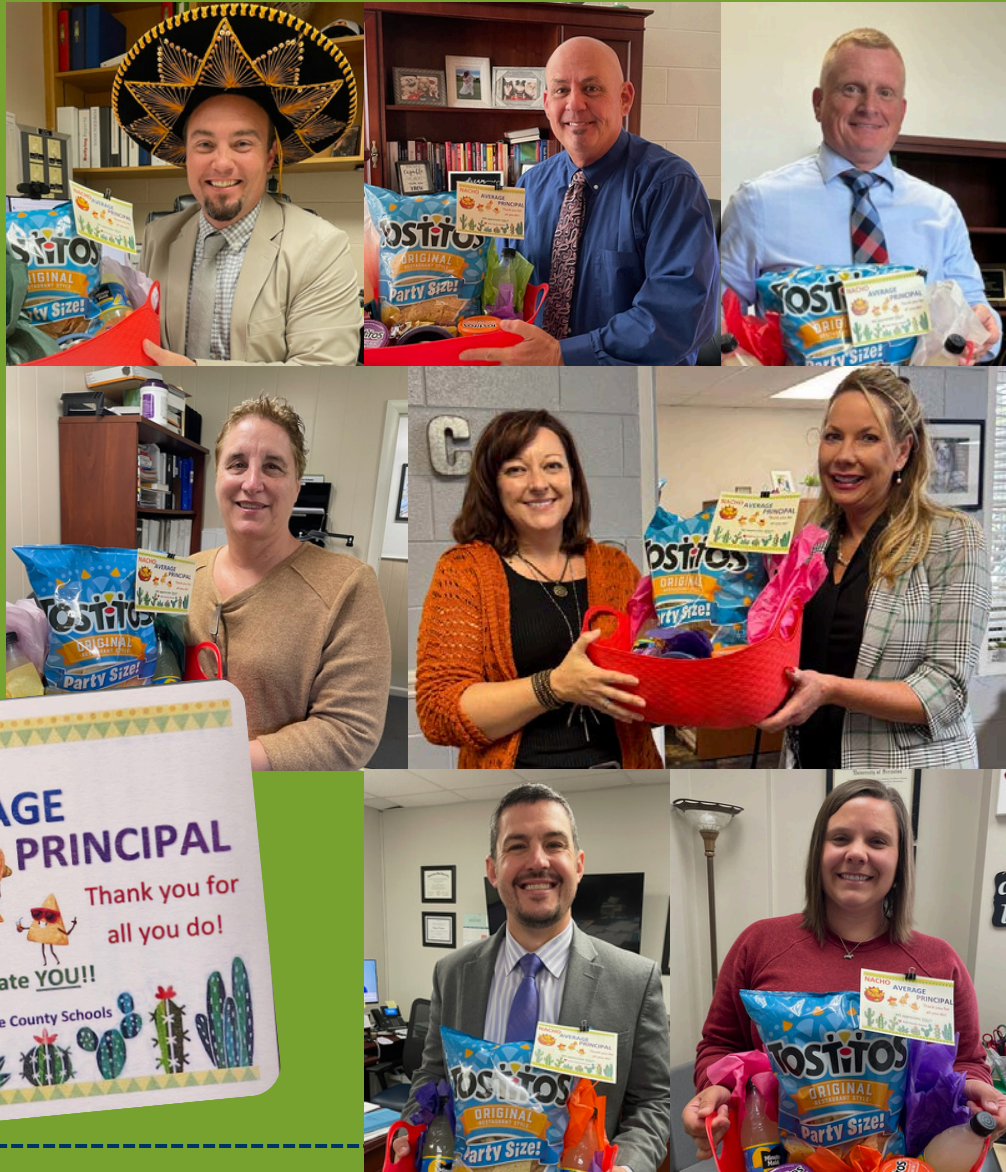

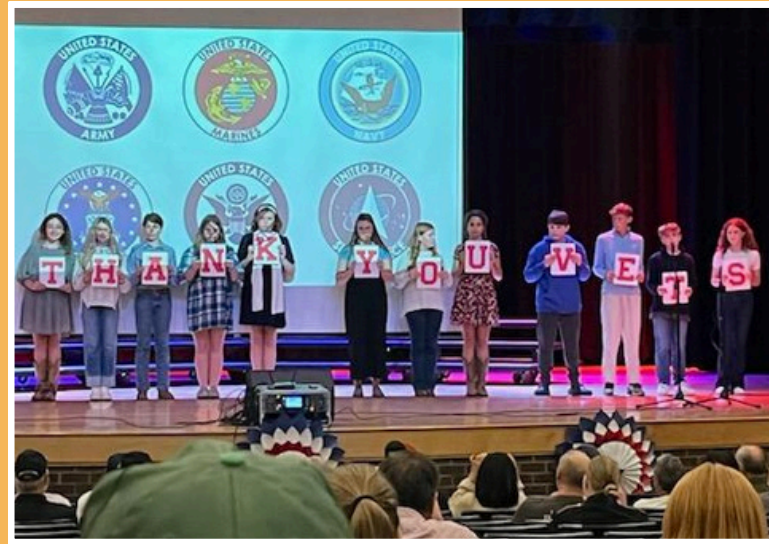
All that's required for eligible students is to complete a simplified application, maintain their GPA, and meet graduation and UNC System requirements. That's right – NO ESSAYS!



Honoring Community Veterans



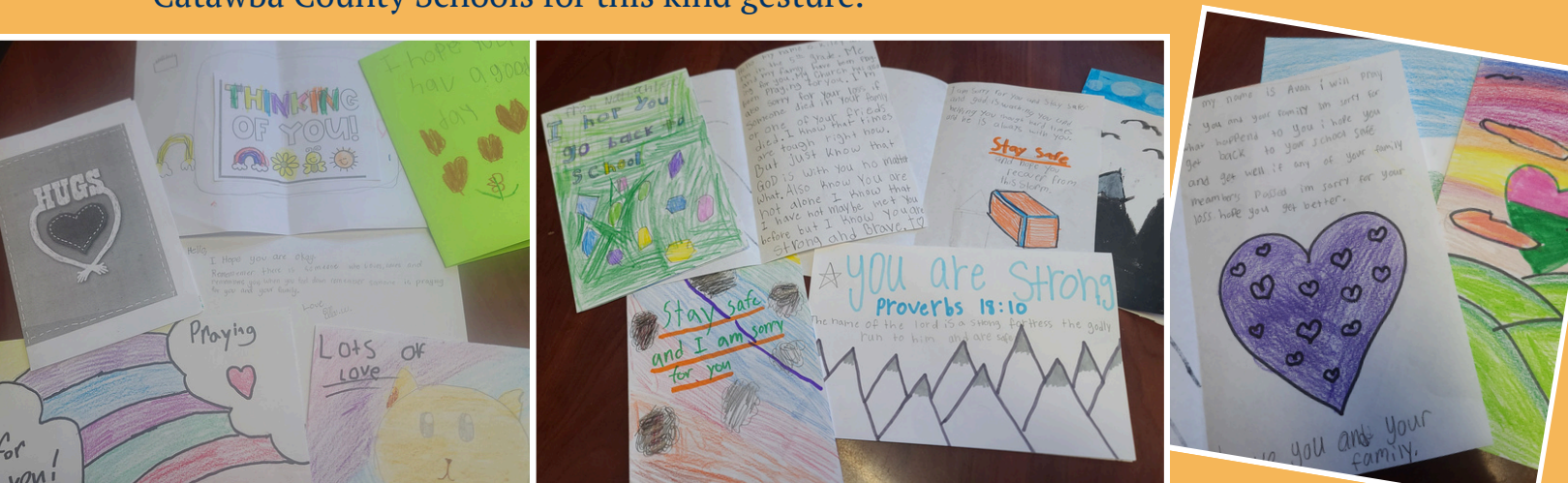
